Dear Old Girls

Writing early in 1985, I can begin appropriately by wishing you all a happy New year! My wife and I enjoyed meeting those of you who came to St Elphin's for last September's Reunion. I now know many more of you personally and it is encouraging to see my Old Girls coming back in greater numbers. The last two Reunions have, of course, been organised by recent leavers - Suzanne Coon, followed by Siân Davies - and it is clear that the younger generation is playing its proper part in the Guild's activities. Inevitably, we were sad to have to accept Eileen Smart's decision to retire as Secretary after so many years in this role. She has insisted that this is the right moment to 'stand down' and I can only thank Eileen most warmly for all her work for the School and for the help and support she has given to successive Heads. The demands of the job are such that, as we feared, no one successor can be found to replace her! Instead, it has been agreed that a group of more recent Old Girls - led by Claire Derry - will form a Committee to share the responsibilities. I am grateful to them for volunteering to do this, and am also pleased to know that our accounts will still be looked after so well by Rosemary Taylor.

After the excitement of the previous academic year - a new building and many other improvements - last year could have seemed tame by comparison. In reality this was not so, and many highlights remain in the memory. Where fund raising is concerned, we have tried to look beyond our own needs and much time has been given to this sphere of activity. St Elphin's played a significant part in Derbyshire's response to the NSPCC Centenary Appeal raising (chiefly through the Sponsored Walk) about £3,000. We became involved in the local Whitworth Hospital's Appeal for a new physiotherapy unit, hosting a Fashion Show organised by Matlock Trader. The girls responded generously too, to Christian Aid Week and the Ethiopian Famine Appeal.

My last letter mentioned that the Friends were about to purchase a new grand piano for the School. A magnificent Bosendorfer instrument has been in the Hall for exactly a year. Its quality has been heard at various School concerts and at two recitals given by distinguished visitors: Richard Baker and friends last March, and Eddie Thompson (the blind jazz pianist) and his trio in October. These artistes were delighted with the piano's quality and having visited the Bosendorfer factory near Vienna last July, I can well understand why. The visit to Vienna marked the climax of the year's music making. 31 Members of the Choral Society, together with 3 staff, spent two memorable weeks in Austria, giving recitals of music both sacred and secular and taking part in an annual Festival of Youth and Music. It was an experience which none of us will forget easily and I felt privileged to be a member of this group.

A School play, "The Importance of Being Earnest"; Sarah Straw's achievement in becoming our first Duke of Edinburgh gold medallist; success (against 7 other schools) in winning a public speaking competition organised by Matlock Speakers Club and a Junior School Open Afternoon last July: these too, were moments of pleasing, if transitory fame for St Elphin's.

Now at the beginning of 1985, we have just heard that Siobhan Watts, of the present Upper Sixth, has been awarded a place at New Hall, Cambridge, where she will read for a degree in Classics. Our present Sixth Form is strong numerically and in academic quality. The Governor's continuing provision of funds for scholarships - most recently at Junior School level - has attracted much attention and I know that this must continue. I hope that you will let your friends know of the Schools's qualities and also, of course, that you will come to visit us during 1985 to see for yourselves what we are doing. We would be delighted to see you at any of the School fixtures listed.

Those living locally may also like to know that we hope to be heard on Radio Derby at around 7.30 am on Easter Day (7th April) taking part for the second year running, in the weekly "Wake up and Sing" series of religious programmes.

I do enjoy hearing from and seeing you. Please do not hesitate to contact me about any aspect of St Elphin's which may interest or concern you at any time. With very best wishes to you all, in which my wife joins.

Treasurer's Report 1983

At the end of 1982, there was a deficit of £78.92 in the Current account; by the end of 1983, we had a balance of £267.39. As always, our biggest expenditure is postage and with the recent increase in postal rates, there will be a minimum of £4-£5 difference on a complete set of notices.

In the Deposit account, starting with a balance of £740.66, we finished with a balance of £715 to carry forward. The credits include £32.81 from Abbey National Building Society and in future as was decided last year, the interest as from January 1984 would be added to our savings account, thus increasing that amount.

We are most grateful to the Governors of the School for a sum of £100 towards the expenses of the address book. We thank them for their generous gift.

During the year I was obliged to change banks as our local branch closed down and the accounts were transferred to National Westminster. However, with new bank ruling concerning the amounts kept in accounts and to avoid the possibility of bank charges, it was decided to put our money into a 7-day account with Abbey National, thus getting interest on the whole sum.

At the time of transfer, the interest rate was 7.5%, to date (Oct 1984) it is 9.5%. This will probably fluctuate but is much better than the bank rates. At the time of writing, our balance is in excess of £1,200 but there will be the usual debts to come shortly for the news letter, printing and postage etc.

### Obituary

Alix Berwick who died on 6 July 1983 was Head Girl in 1926-27 and a distinguished St Elphinite who always remembered the School with affection and gratitude.

She read Classics at Girton, where she devoted much of her energies to the ecumenical and international interests which were to be so dear to her heart throughout her life. After Cambridge, she taught at Overstone School, Northampton and at Queen Margaret's School, Scarborough. Her first Headship was at Redlands High School, Bristol from 1940-44. The School was near Filton Aircraft Works and her day often began by sweeping incendiaries off the tennis courts! She endured horrific experiences with outwardly unruffled calm but the nightly emergencies haunted her for very many years, although, typically, she never revealed this to her friends until the nightmares had ceased. After a spell at St Michael's School, Petworth, (then temporarily at Bognor Regis) Alix was appointed to H M Inspectorate and continued in this work until her retirement.



In recent years Alix, who was devoted to her family, was very fully occupied helping with the problems of her brothers and her sister (also a St Elphinite, Kathleen, always known as 'Ti') and also making contact with family relations, resulting in visits to many countries.

Alix's attractive personality gained her a host of friends in many countries and in all walks of life. She was deeply interested in the centre at Taise and in the World Council of Churches, with a particular interest in the Society of St Sergius and St Alban.

Alix was a very modest and unassuming person. It was only on her last visit to me that I discovered that she was a gifted painter several of whose works had been exhibited in Paris. But, in spite of her gentleness, Alix had great strength of character as well as a natural dignity and was fearless in defence of her deeply-felt principles. After her retirement she became a Lay Reader in the Diocese of Winchester; had it been possible she would have sought ordination and she has long seemed to me a very cogent argument for the ordination of women!
