Coinciding as it does with the recent retirement from St Elphin's of both Judith Crook and Mavis Hunter, I want this to be a really special occasion in which many of you can share. Inevitably, preparations for the Reunion have been my main St Elphin's link in recent months, but I was delighted to be present at the School in early July for the end of term staff farewell to Miss Crook,

Miss Cawood, Mrs Hunter and other staff leaving last term. The Reunion preparations have also brought many letters, and it is lovely to be in touch again with former pupils in this way.

Family concerns have continued to dominate my life here in North Yorks. Matters arising

Obituaries

Jill Cartwright nee Mulshaw

Lizzie Todd nee Edwards has written the following tribute to Jill.

It was a typically Derbyshire day, when we met for the service to the memory of Jill Cartwright, in the beautiful little church of St. Nicholas in Little Braxted, Essex. All the hymns had been chosen by her and her family, before she died. I was instantly back at St. Elphins where she once read the lesson pronouncing the bow of the boat as a 'beaux'. The poignancy of the occasion was made even more moving by the fact she had chosen music from La Boheme and the finale with Louis Armstrong singing, "What a wonderful world" – a most appropriate song for Jill. I had never thought of Jill as an Essex girl, when we first met in September 1944, at the age of 10 and a half. A large number of newcomers were children whose parents thought we would be safer in rural Derbyshire than in cities throughout Britain. We were a mixed bunch – we came from families from all walks of life: farming, architecture, medicine, commerce and literature, as well as the Church which, until then, had been predominant. Jill and I shared a dormitory and became firm friends. As we both grew up, we vied for extra coupons for large feet. Coupons were needed before we could buy any clothes, and as our feet grew so did our coupon ration. Almost our only escape from school were to concerts in Sheffield, to hear the Halle Orchestra, and each form

was allowed to choose a place to go for Ascension Day. Jill and I knew the area well, and I hope our form benefited from glorious days out in the hills and dales. Some of my happiest days were spent with Jill's mother, at her home in Lea – it was a welcome delight, an absolute haven, created by a happy family. I loved them all.

Jill and I competed in most sports, and Jill excelled. (I did win the Vitrex Ludorum from her twice) but she was destined to succeed. Our only challenger was a new girl who arrived from Africa. Joyce Odamton came when we were thirteen and presented us with real competition – oh, what fun it was.

In 1947 the snows lay for months, over the walls and fields and it was wonderful for sledging. Nothing could keep us away, especially a few maths lessons!

Jill's life was full and she was the right choice to be Head Girl. Her life progressed through her choice of career and her enormous success at fencing. Again, she chose well when she met John. She and John had four children, the oldest boy's resemblance to his mother made me gasp. Jill created a very happy family. She will be remembered by all who knew her, as a treasured memory.

Letter received from Beryl West nee Renwick

My sister, Dorothy Joyce Renwick, died on 7th April this year, aged 84. Dorothy was at St Elphin's

from 1922 to 1933 and was head of Powys and head girl. After Girton, Cambridge where she read French and German, Dorothy did a teacher training course and taught at Huyton College, Liverpool and was evacuated to the Lake District.

Subsequently Dorothy became deputy head at Loughborough High School for Girls and then for 21 years was headmistress of Kidderminster Girls' High School (now amalgamated with King Charles boys' school). The Old Girls Association of this school is setting up a memorial scholarship in memory of Dorothy and there is already a modern building named after her.

I loved reading the last newsletter and was filled with a mixture of nostalgia and vivid memories when I read that Miss Robinson had just celebrated her 90th birthday. It is now 33 years since I left St Elphin's and the time seems to have flown by.

I remember a very different school to the one I visited some two years ago. The sixties was a time of permissiveness and the Beatles, but for those 'incarcerated' it was a time of strict discipline and what seemed to us at that time, petty tyrannies. Miss Robinson was Headmistress then and those of us who knew her will never forget her, whether it be with affection or otherwise. Most of us found her quite forbidding. She seemed incredibly tall. The suits she wore were almost regimental! Mostly dark grey and well tailored. To us she was the original 'Iron Lady'. Her face was devoid of nay make-up; high arched light brown eyebrows that framed ice blue eyes, eyes that saw EVERYTHING.

I can see her now as I write. Standing erect her hands folded in front, the thumbs twirling slowly round each other as her eyes bore into one's head, whilst the words, 'My poor dear child. I feel so sorry for you' came from her lips.

I am sure Maud had no intention of being the arch villain we had made her, but to this day I only have to mention her name to any

old girls from that time and they still cringe in fear as if she was the proverbial bogeyman, ready to 'pop' out from under their bed!

You may probably think I am writing a very unkind picture of Miss Robinson, but believe me when I say that in those days she was fearsome, and kept us in strict order. When I look back I think it was her way of keeping us on the straight and narrow; to make us good, caring people ready to face an uncertain future. In that part of the brain that retains memory, she evokes a whole era; an inner world of formality and religious fervour that battled with an outside world of screaming pop fans, free love, flower power and drugs. I can definately say I shall never forget Miss Robinson.

Letter received from Florence Mahony nee Peters

It is nearly two years since I visited the school! It was a very happy weekend for me and I only regretted the absence of Old Girls who had been at school with me in the mid 1940's. What impressive developments, especially in the kitchen and dining room. I'm afraid I found the school food quite unpalatable, certainly my West Africa palate could not appreciate steamed cod fish or dripping on bread for elevenses etc. Yet I survived. That St Elphin's today should boast of a renowned chef beats the imagination!

NEWS FROM OLD GIRLS

(Unfortunately this letter just missed last years newsletter)
I have been meaning to write with our news but it was only on receiving the latest newsletter that I have been spurred into action.

My sisters and I were at St Elphin's during the '70's, all of us in Selwyn House. I started in 1971, Debbie followed in 1973 and finally Vanessa arrived in 1975.

We were all very upset when in 1990, Debbie left for Australia to work in ICU in a Sydney hospital. She planned to stay for only a few years but before long had met an Aussie whom she married in this country in 1994.

We were all "over the moon" when Debbie gave birth to Connor in June 1997 on his Daddy's birthday. She had lots of health problems including diabetes and had to be so careful during her pregnancy. Our happiness was short-lived as on 26th July 1997, Debbie found Connor dead. He had a diaphragmatic hernia which hadn't been picked up. We really didn't think matters could get any worse when on 25th September 1997 Peter phoned to tell us that Debbie had suffered a "hypo" and had been on her own for up to 5 hours and was now in a coma.

From the beginning we were told that if Debbie came round she would be brain damaged and this is the case. Over the months she has made some progress and her long term memory is quite good but she has very little short term memory and because of this it seems unlikely that she will ever be independent or even come home. She left hospital after 7 months and is now in a nursing home.

During those awful first few months I felt that my sister had died that night but I know that she most definitely has not – anyone who knew her will know what I mean!

Nobody knows what the future holds for Debbie. We just thank God that she has such a wonderful husband who is having to cope with all this after only 3 years of marriage.

I would be grateful if you could remember Debbie and Peter in your prayers at the reunion.
